Synopsis of the Play

Prologue

London, 1728; a member of the company of beggars has produced a play about the modes of the day. A player assures him that those who live by the muses encourage poetical merit wherever they find it and calls for the overture.

Act I

As the curtain rises, Peachum, the kingpin of crime, is happily ruling his underworld kingdom when he learns his daughter Polly has married the bandit Captain Macheath. Peachum and Mrs. Peachum, who fear that Macheath will have them executed to get their money, resolve to have him arrested. But love is stronger than blood - Polly warns Macheath of her parents' plans and he escapes.

Act II

Macheath meets with his gang in a tavern near Newgate, apprises them of his problem with Peachum, and plans to lie low for awhile. Enter several charming ladies of the evening, two of whom cunningly disarm him and turn him over to Peachum for the reward. Macheath finds himself incarcerated, unable to escape the scorn of Lockit's daughter Lucy, who carries his child. Macheath convinces Lucy he is not married to Polly after all. Not without misglvings, Lucy slips the keys from her father, and Macheath escapes.

ACT III

Lockit is furious that Lucy has helped Macheath to escape. He goes to Peachum to wrest the secret of his son-in-law's whereabouts from him. Macheath meets with his gang and directs their criminal activities for the evening. He is seen by Diana Trapes, who sells the information to Peachum and Lockit. Lucy attempts to poison Polly, but fails when Peachum and Lockit bring in Macheath. Lucy and Polly pledge their undying love as the townspeople come in to see Macheath hanged. The Player appeals to the Beggar to supply the play with a happy ending; the Beggar relents, cries a reprieve, and the play comes to a happy and triumphant conclusion.
